OUR VALUES AT WORK

MARY AIKENHEAD MINISTRIES TRUSTEES VISIT MELBOURNE

Recent consultation across St Vincent's Health Australia (SVHA) has reinforced the unequivocal commitment of staff to compassion as a value which is integral to the nature of their delivery of health and aged care. When the two Trustees of Mary Aikenhead Ministries (TMAM) appointed in 2011, Dr Tessa Ho and Professor Gabrielle McMullen, and recently appointed Trustee, Jim Russell, visited St Vincent's Health Melbourne (SVHM) on 27-28 March we saw that commitment in action.

Our visit commenced at the Fitzroy campus of the health service where we were briefed by Professor Patricia O'Rourke, Chief Executive Officer, about key activities of SVHM and strategic initiatives. The meeting was also an opportunity to meet senior executives. The gathering began with an acknowledgement of country by Michelle Winters, Senior Aboriginal Health Liaison Officer, and we were particularly pleased to learn of her work in promoting Indigenous health and Indigenous employment at SVHM. Professor O'Rourke generously made Lisa McDonald, Director of Mission, available to host the Trustees' two days in Melbourne. Lisa led a reflection during the briefing that allowed the group to contemplate on their shared commitment to Catholic health and aged care.

Our first clinical visit was across Melbourne at Port Phillip Prison where SVHM provides health services. We were driven there by Stephen Vale, Director of Medical Services, Aged and Community Care, whose portfolio includes the prison ministry, offered through three wards at Port Phillip Prison and the secure St Augustine's Ward at the Fitzroy campus. The SVHM staff at the prison provide remarkable care, focused on the human dignity of each patient. We learned how they advocate for their patients to ensure appropriate services from the prison authorities.

During our visit we were very conscious of the prison ministry offered by Mary Aikenhead and the first Sisters of Charity in Dublin, and the pioneering Australian Sisters' presence in both the Parramatta and Hobart Female Factories. The continuation of the ministry through the presence of SVHM at Port Phillip Prison, manifests service of the poor in the tradition of the Sisters of Charity.

We returned to the Fitzroy campus for lunch at Briar Terrace where the Sisters of Charity, under the leadership of Bernadette Mundy, conduct a drop-in cottage for the homeless and socially isolated people from the local community. We met participants and volunteers, before going next door to Sr Francesca Healy Cottage. Under Manager Byron Lazarides, the latter, which is generally known as 'The Cottage,' provides short-term health care in a supportive residential environment for those experiencing or at risk of homelessness. We valued hearing about these two ministries and highlight them as important examples of the welfare activities across Mary Aikenhead Ministries.

During Monday afternoon the Trustees visited a range of in-patient facilities, including the Cardiac Investigation Unit, Emergency Department, Intensive Care Unit and Mental Health. Kerry Bradley, General Manager of Medical Services, and her staff, made us very welcome and, from our interactions with them and patients, we were highly impressed by the quality of care and commitment to excellence and innovation. We gained further insight into clinical services the following morning, when we toured the impressive new St Vincent's Cancer Centre with Dr Ray Snyder, Director of Cancer Services.

At the conclusion of Monday afternoon we were privileged to visit Cambridge House, one of SVHM's aged care facilities. Maryanne Welch, General Manager of Aged and Community Care, introduced us to staff and the culturally-diverse residents, to gain an understanding of the holistic programs provided by Cambridge House.

SVHA has a national and international reputation for its leadership in medical research, and on Tuesday morning we toured the two Melbourne research institutes. Our first visit was to St Vincent's Institute of Medical Research where Director Professor Tom Kay and his staff provided us with an overview of facilities and programs. After morning tea we toured the O'Brien Institute and Professor Wayne Morrison, Director, and his staff briefed us on the Institute's micro and regenerative surgery programs which "act as a bridge between fundamental advances and scientific discoveries and their clinical application." We congratulate the staff at the two institutes on their world-class internationally competitive medical research.

Our two days at SVHM concluded with the opportunity to meet the pastoral care team.

We are most grateful to all those within SVHM who live out the mission and values of our ministries, and thank them for their warm welcome and hospitality shown to us during our visit.

¹The mission of the Sovereign Military Order of Malta, which was founded ca. 1048, is to serve the sick, the disadvantaged and those in natural disaster and conflict situations. In the Catholic Church, the Grand Master ranks as the highest official after the cardinals and, in addition to the Pope, is the only modern leader of an entity within the Catholic Church to be considered a sovereign monarch.

- *It has given us courage to believe that "just because it hasn't been done before, doesn't mean it can't be done now."*
