
Love is both central and sacred to our mission.

OPEN SUPPORT

'Agape' love is more than an emotion. It is a sentiment that demonstrates itself through actions.

In the creation of her ministry, the Venerable Mary Aikenhead was well aware of the growing community need in Ireland for 'agape' love. In Bishop Polding's plea to Mary to send her Congregation of Sisters to Australia, he recognised that we needed it. And in the creation of St Vincent's Open Support, the Sisters identified a group of people, often overlooked, that desperately needed it too. Their legacy of demonstrating love for their fellow human beings, and in particular those who were vulnerable, with unmet need, continues to be at the forefront of our mission at Open Support.

Building on the charism and traditions of the Sisters of Charity to serve the poor and vulnerable in the community, Open Support's programs are available to women and children escaping domestic violence (DFV), particularly those from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and helping socially isolated adults to build capacity in their community.

One in six women have experienced violence by an intimate partner¹ and domestic violence incidents reported to the police increased 3% annually over the past 5 years². Last year Open Support provided accommodation and support services to 32 women and 41 children escaping from DFV. 31 out of 32 women have now settled into their own homes and have found jobs or are attending education.



Thanks to the wrap-around, client-centred, strength-based approach, and skilled and understanding staff, Open Support were able to assist these women to find that inner strength and confidence that they needed to take this next brave step in their journey. They are carried by 'agape' love. In mid-2023, Open Support will be expanding this program and will open a new crisis accommodation facility, essentially tripling their impact in the community.

COVID taught many of us for the first time what it means to be socially isolated. Sadly, it is an ongoing reality, with 25% of Australians saying they are experiencing loneliness with a cost of \$2.7 billion of Australia's health expenditure going towards loneliness related ill health³. Open Support's Social Isolation program has had life changing effects on many of its participants. Our caring staff and volunteers take the time to truly listen to their clients and assist them in creating meaningful, ongoing connections within their local communities, based on their interests and needs.

Open Support couldn't achieve everything they do without their volunteer team that is instrumental in supporting our clients. From volunteer driving and phone support, to volunteering in our gift shop or fundraising, our reach is wider and filled with more love, because of this amazing team of people.

MAM CONFERENCE (MAY 2023)

The first Mary Aikenhead Ministries Conference in four years was held at the Amora Hotel in Sydney on 11 and 12 May 2023.

We were truly blessed to have with us a significant number of Sisters of Charity whose presence lifted all of us.

In curating the conference program, the Trustees were mindful that the world had changed since 2019 and that there had been a flow-on impact of changes across our ministries; and those impacts continue to influence our mission and workplaces.

We were also aware of the many new people at governance, executive and leadership levels who had joined Mary Aikenhead Ministries since 2019.

It certainly was the hope of the Trustees that the conference would touch everyone's hearts and minds and that they would leave affirmed, challenged, and inspired in their respective ministry.

There were three components that were chosen to form the narrative of the conference program.

- 1. Making our history who we are and how did we get here?
- 2. Australia: Context and Challenges
- 3. MAM for today and tomorrow.

Interwoven in these three strands was our Conference Companion Fr Frank Brennan SJ AO, who offered us his insights and challenges on the learnings of the conference.

We were also proud to launch the Inaugural Mary Aikenhead Ministries Oration.



It was wonderful to have a diverse range of speakers, including both local and international, and we intend, where possible, to put these presentations onto our website in the near future.

A highlight of the Conference for many was our coming together at the end of day 1 to celebrate a beautiful Mass in the historic St Patrick's Church, which happens to also be the oldest surviving Catholic Church in NSW. Our Mission and Formation Director, Louwana Saba and her team of volunteers excelled in leading us in such faith filled liturgies throughout the course of the whole conference.

Following the conference, we sought feedback from the delegates, and we are truly grateful for everyone who took the time to provide their feedback on both what they found uplifting and what they found disappointing. It was all constructive and we will truly endeavor to learn from those things which some of you highlighted that can make our next conference even better.

It seems a great many participants thoroughly enjoyed the showcasing of our ministries and just about everyone appreciated and valued Father Frank Brennans' analysis and challenges contained in his summation of the conference.









A number were disappointed that there was little table discussion after each presentation and the Trustees will reflect carefully on these comments regarding overseas speakers as well as the technological challenges that poses when the presentation is on-line.

However, our intention is that the conference is a journey – our history, how we got here, what 'here' in Australia looks like for society and the Church (as we are a work of the Church) and then looking to the broader world and then the future. We pray that the conference continues as each participant takes back to their workplace the call to consider our story in the context of these times and looking to the future. Just as the work the sisters commenced in the 1980s prepared the way for the PJP, and the work to create the PJP prepared what we are now able to do.

It is by the work we do today that we will continue to be a ministry that flourishes in the decades to come. Hopefully people will share the conference with others, think about what they heard, consider what challenged them and understand that what we do today sets us up for tomorrow.

Inaugural Venerable Mary Aikenhead Oration (May 2023)

This year during our Conference we held our inaugural Venerable Mary Aikenhead Oration. The idea for this Oration began as a seed that grew over many years. Our hope was that in creating the Mary Aikenhead Oration we would seek to share her more widely and create a deeper understanding of the charism and founding story of Mary Aikenhead and the Religious Sisters of Charity. We must know and honour this important spiritual legacy that has inspired, served and helped to shape the Catholic Church across the world and particularly in Australia. In examining our times accompanied by the story of Mary Aikenhead, we hope to contribute to the intellectual life of the Australian Church and continue her legacy.

The Oration was given on Thursday 11 May 2023, by Dr Bernadette Tobin and a response was provided by Dr Xavier Symons.

Bernadette Tobin is a renowned bioethicist and philosopher who has made significant contributions to ethical debates and progress in Australia. Bernadette has worked closely with the health sector, most especially in her role as Director of The Plunkett Centre for Ethics. Dr Xavier Symons is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the Human Flourishing Program at Harvard's Institute for Quantitative Social Science. Xavier's research interests include ethical issues at the beginning and end of life, conscientious objection, ethical issues in aged care, and pandemic ethics.

The topic chosen by Bernadette was a quote by Venerable Mary Aikenhead: "Do pray that justice may be accomplished in peace and that truth may prevail." The Oration explored the question of: what attitude should a healthy, pluralist, liberal, democratic society take to healthcare institutions which will not perform socially controversial but legally permissible practices such as abortion and euthanasia? Xavier's response focused on the fundamental orientation that Catholic institutions, and in particular, Catholic schools have toward the common good.





We were fortunate to be able to live stream the event, and had many guests join online and inperson. Our hope is that the Venerable Mary Aikenhead Oration will continue in years to come, and the legacy and inspiration of Mary Aikenhead will continue to reach a broader audience.

"Today we had the opportunity to connect with part of the physical origin of the Sisters' story with a visit to the Heritage Centre.



PALLIATIVE CARE

People, relationships, love and saying farewell in a context of palliative care is full of personal emotions especially when it is someone close to you.

My dearest wife died in 1990...as many of us know it seems like yesterday, 33 years ago. As family, we had cared for Michele at home for three years. We were only married for six years and the last three were especially hard. Yet, full of love. Indeed, Chele was so often the leader who supported us to keep the joy in each day. The community nurses and her Professor ensured she received the palliative care needed, the transfusions, some radiotherapy and medications. They also built relationships with her through their shared love and care. Michele had been given three months to live in 1988 with a diagnosis of Grawitz tumour (kidney) with metastasis on the spine. Instead of three months Michele lived a full life (with her limitations) for three years. Lunches out, ambulance trips to Botanical Gardens, new babies, birthdays and countless visits from family and friends. The support and palliative care given, to us all, enabled Chele to stay at home. The services were supplied through a Sydney public hospital with love and care foundational.

Now, forward 33 years, people of all ages still wish to be 'at home' wherever that may be for them at this time of their lives. It is a choice many choose ... indeed desire.

My Uncle Bob is 95 living in an aged care centre and being supported by St Vincent's Palliative Care. The excellence, love, respect and dignity is core to the care he receives. He says he has had a great life, amazed to have made it to 95 and



still has words he whispers to his visitors in these his last days. This is his choice. For the family, the communication and the monitoring of his daily condition by Drs and the aged care staff support us as well as Uncle. A photo of Uncle (June 6, 2023), shows his transistor in his hand as he waves to an incoming visitor. He likes to keep engaged in what's going on.

St Vincent's has a 100+ years of delivering support and palliative care. Nurses have at their core love and care for their patients at all phases of life. Support and Palliative care nurses and Drs bring with them to every person and their families a sense of peace and calm in most difficult times.

To all those involved in Support and Palliative care across St Vincent's hospitals and aged care may Christ's blessings and graces continue to guide YOUR excellence, love and integrity that you bring into the lives of people.

Director Department of Addiction Medicine St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne

Which of the organisations within Mary Aikenhead Ministries do you work for, and how long have you been there?

Most of my career has been at St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne, from medical student to becoming an Addiction Physician and eventually Director of the Department of Addiction Medicine, only interrupted when working overseas and having four children.

The MAM values are love, justice, compassion, hope. Which of these resonates most with you and why?

My favourite MAM value is 'compassion' because concern for others struggling with addiction underpins our work – we imagine ourselves in their shoes and help as best we can.

What do you think sets your organization/ministry apart from other workplaces?

Our work as an institution is special! So often, staff will 'go the extra mile' be it for a patient or to support a colleague, because it's an unspoken truism at St Vincent's! Our team in Addiction Medicine balance work with 'down time', sharing meals, having cake (any reason will do) and sharing lots of laughs! We love working with junior staff and even after they move on to other areas of Medicine, they often drop in to visit, send us photos of places they're working or travelling or even better, send pictures of their newborn babies!



If you were to have lunch with Venerable Mary Aikenhead today, what story would you tell her about your work?

Having lunch with the Venerable Mary Aikenhead would be awesome! I would share our challenges and often heartbreaking vulnerability we witness - physical and mental ill-health, broken relationships with family, friends, loss of employment, housing. I am always mindful of preventing 'burnout' in our hard-working team, and her perspective would be invaluable. The Sisters of Charity would have worked long hard days, with fewer resources than we have.

What do you think she might say to you in reply?

In terms of her response, my impression of the Venerable Mary Aikenhead is that she'd be quite matter of fact and likely quote what is posted on a wall at our hospital: "Even when you are the best, you desire to be more...to go beyond!" Hmmm...that's one inspiring, nononsense taskmaster!

The strong sense of community at CLC provides a feeling of belonging for students and staff; it is a welcoming and inclusive community that puts everyone's well-being at the heart of everything we do.

If you were to have lunch with Venerable Mary Aikenhead today, what story would you tell her about your work?

Rather than telling her about my work in the Resource Centre, I would love to invite Venerable Mary Aikenhead in and show her the space and the work that we do. I think she would be surprised to see how much the role of the library has changed over the years and what a vibrant community hub it is. She would see for herself that the Resource Centre is a welcoming, inclusive, and safe space that encourages collaboration, exploration and creation and that it is as much a learning space as it is a social space.



At one end of the room she may see students reading a book or working on a group project while over in the MakerSpace students may be engaged in some coding or some knitting; in front of the large TV screen other students may be competing in a Mario Kart challenge. She would be delighted to hear Book Club members passionately discussing their books or she may read some of the outrageous plots Writers' Club members have devised, and they would love to tell her about their participation in the Write A Book In A Day challenge. Meanwhile, year 7 students would enjoy telling her about their Human Library experience at CLC and all that they learnt about the history of the college by borrowing a 'human book.'

It would be my hope that she may experience for herself the vibrancy students bring into the space, how they energise us and remind us daily why we love what we do.
